This report highlights the achievements of County Cork Volunteer Centre (CVC) in 2018. We offer support and guidance to individuals and Volunteer Involving Organisations (VIOs) to reach their individual and collective goals while making a significant contribution to their local community and society.

Cork Volunteer Centre has a prime location on North Main Street in the heart of Cork City. With a 'shop' front and reception open to all members of the public to inquire, register or book a meeting. Through our location, our social media channels, newsletters and press coverage, we are maximising the benefits and opportunities of volunteering as well as supporting the 600 non-profit organisations registered with us.

Seeking to create even greater inclusion, we are collaborating with the City and County Public Participation Networks, creating alliances and partnerships with the FAI and SHEP (Social Heath and Education Project), and tailoring information sessions to the unemployed, migrants and new arrivals in our communities.

- Recruitment of trustees through TrustlE.

## 3c. Volunteer Leadership Training

We delivered Volunteer Leadership Training to a number of different organisations across Cork City and County as follows:

### 3d. TrustlE

In 2018, the Department of Rural and Community Development funded a pilot project which aimed to support community and voluntary organisations to recruit trustees. The project also aimed to support volunteers to find trustee opportunities to become involved in. This pilot project was entitled TrustlE and Cork Volunteer Centre (along with Dublin City, Dun Laoghaire Rathdown, Fingal, Galway and South Dublin Volunteer Centres) was one of the centres who participated.













#### There were three main aspects to the project;

- A workshop for organisations wishing to recruit volunteers to their Boards.
- An information session for volunteers interested in becoming trustees.
- A matchmaking event where interested volunteers could meet members of the organisation wishing to recruit trustees.

### WORKSHOP

The workshop for organisations took place in Blackpool in June. The workshop was to get organisations to assess their needs in relation to trustees. For example, to consider the experience and knowledge required by their organisation. The workshop also assisted the organisations to design and write up the requirements of the trustee role.

Olive Tree Consulting's evaluation of the TrustlE Project indicated that it has the capacity to respond to the needs of community organisations, in particular, the requirement of organisations to be compliant with the Charities Regulator's new code of governance. The report concluded that 'TrustlE demonstrated the Volunteer Centre's capacity to deliver the programme as well as the real opportunity for significant and long-lasting change for both volunteer-involving organisations and volunteers'.

Cork Volunteer Centre continues to assist organisations with their recruitment of trustees.
